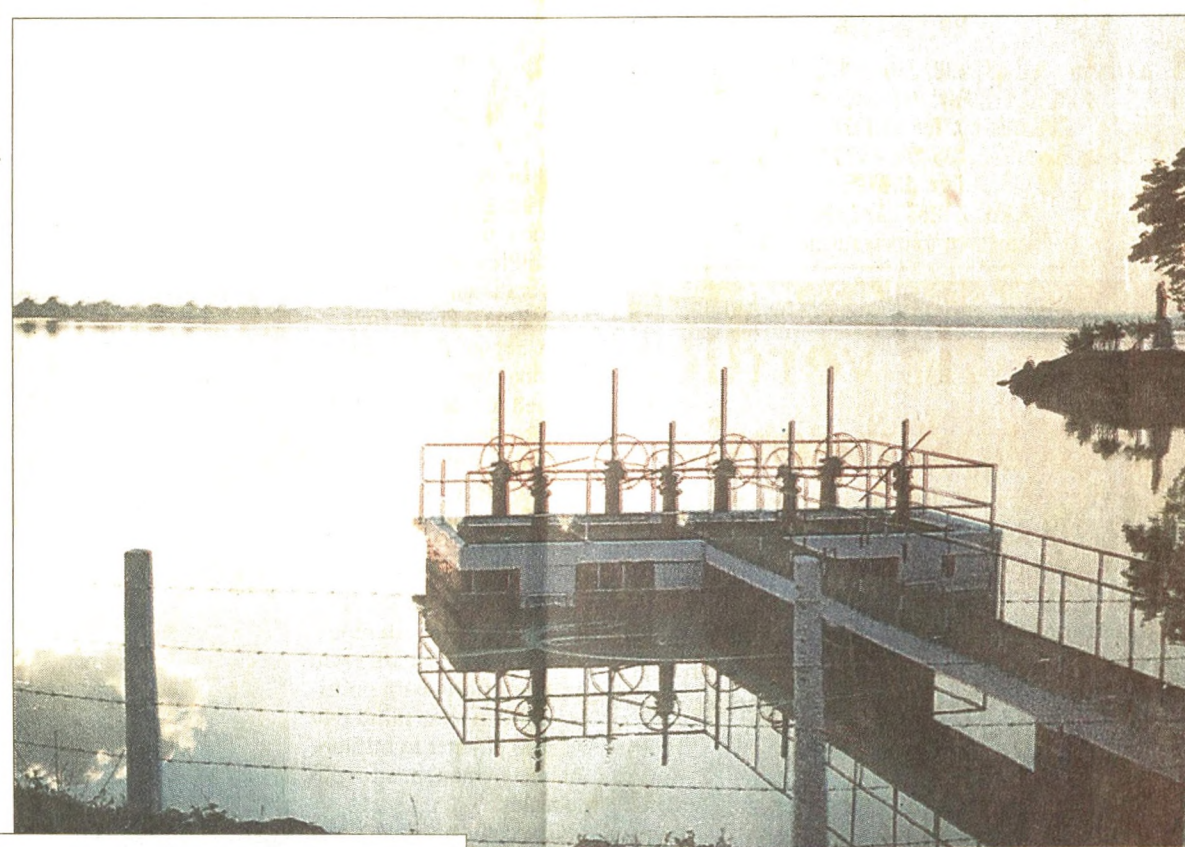
Passing through the portals of the IESL is equivalent to obtaining a university degree and the degree awarded by the
